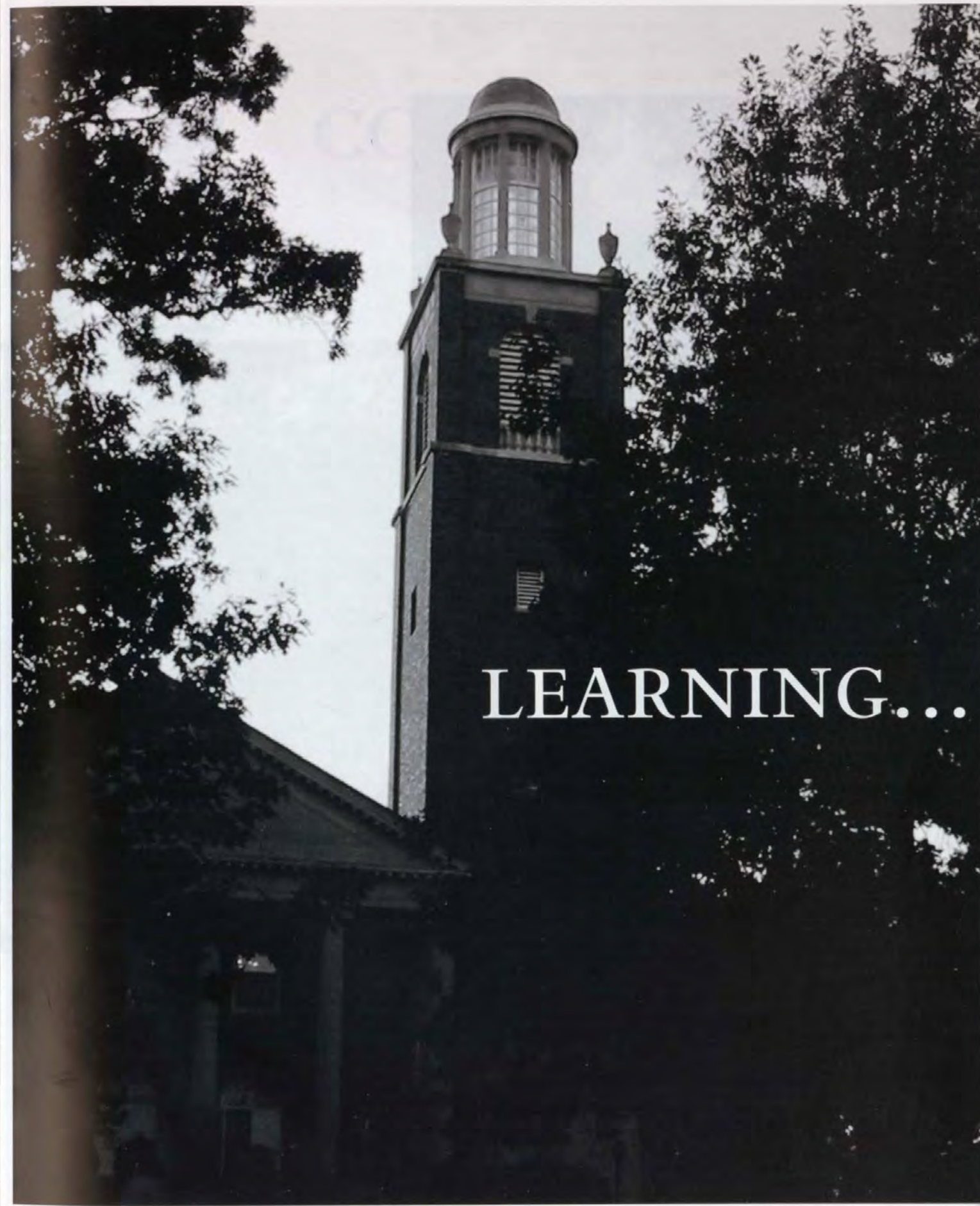
A CAMPUS OF...

Hornet Volleyball

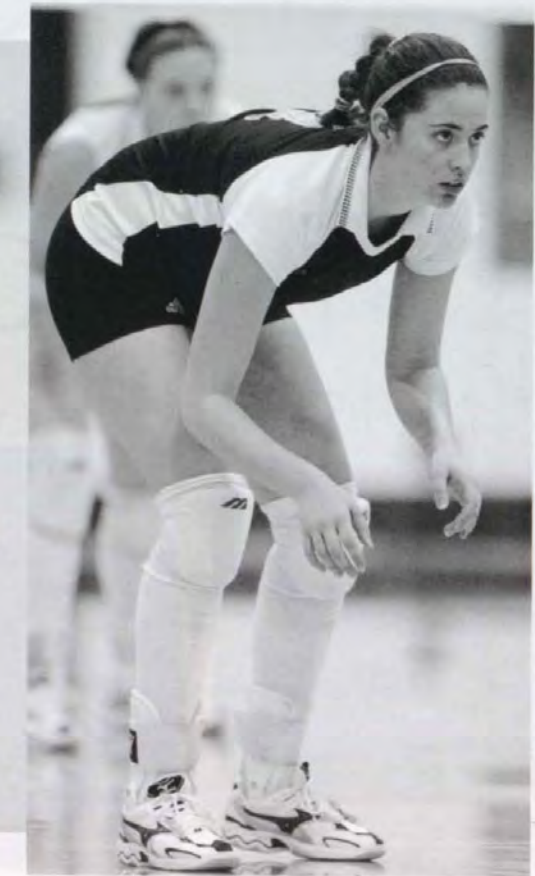
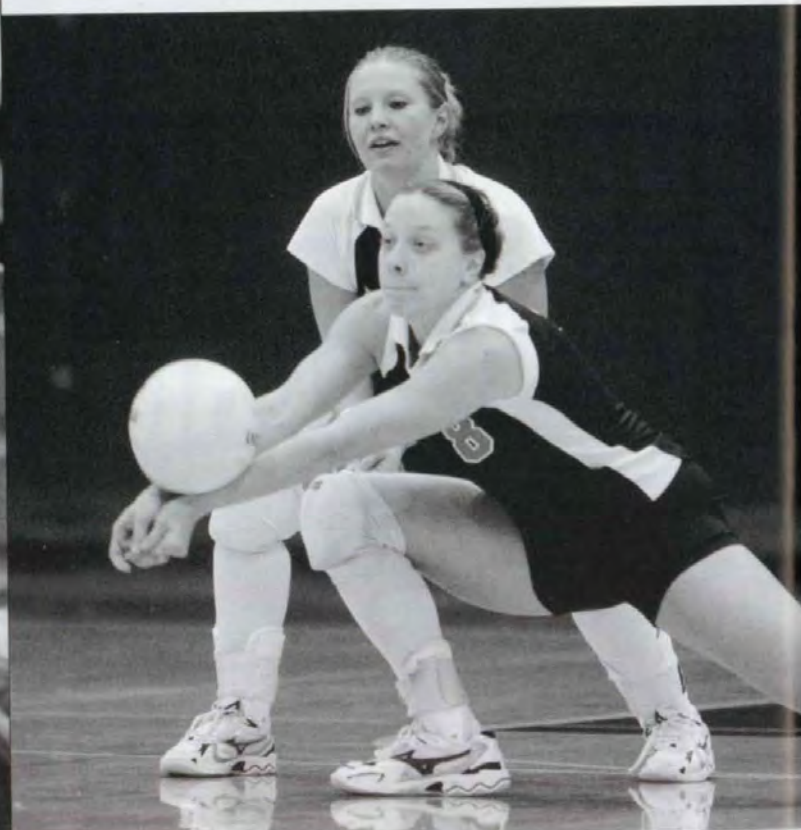
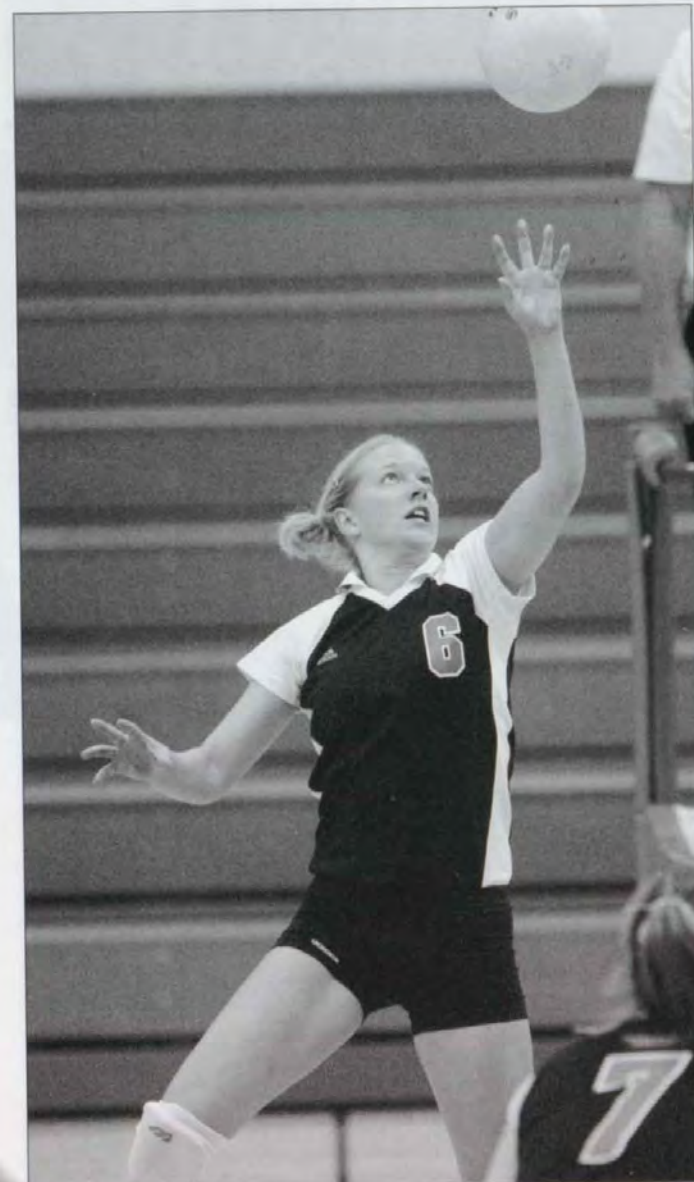

A Short History of the Mud and Mayhem Society

The Mud and Mayhem Society was founded in the summer of 2003 by Charles Fulton, Daniel Huffman, Nathan Vachon, and Michael Woods-deWitt. The goal of this new society was to promote political discourse, offer alternative points of view, and engage in what one founder called "a healthy bout of rabble-rousing." It was decided that the best forum for this effort would be a new newspaper that stood apart from the *Index*. Thus began *Mayhem's Murmurs*, which first hit the stands October 1, 2003. The *Murmurs* differs from the *Index* in that it focuses on political commentary and rarely reports news. There have, however, been several notable exceptions, including the *Murmurs'* interview President Jones regarding the state of public education (November 21, 2003), and the sending of a correspondent to the School of Americas protest (November 24, 2003).

Mayhem's Murmurs is characterized by the use of nineteenth century sketch portraits, frequently archaic rhetoric, and overly clever literary references that differentiate it from the *Index*. The mascot of the Society is Robert Lowe, a nineteenth century British politician known both for his brilliance and his combativeness. Three of the four founders are history majors, which helps explain an apparent obsession with antiquarian values and symbols.

Initially a private venture existing on the fringes, the Mud and Mayhem Society became a registered organization during the Winter of 2004. Now armed with semi-official status and a budget to match, the society hopes to expand beyond the publication of the paper.

Air France-KLM Created

Sept. 9, 2003.
After 21 months of dialogue, a \$1 billion merger deal was announced by Air France and KLM Royal Dutch Airlines. The new company, called Air France-KLM, will continue to operate their passenger service, freight, as normal.

China Launches Man into Space

October 14, 2003.
China joins Russia and the United States as the only country to launched a person into space. Yang Liwei became China's first Taikonaut, the equivalent to cosmonaut or astronaut. Plans exist for more launches and a possible space station.

Concorde Laid to Rest

October 24, 2003.

The legendary Concorde is grounded by British Airways and Air France after an accident in July 2000, in France. Record times, the fastest of which stands at three hours, five minutes, and 34 seconds for a flight between London and the U.S. have now become a thing of the past.

Libya to End WMD Programmes

December 20, 2003.

Libyan leader, Colonel Muammar Gaddafi, announces plans to scrap his country's nuclear programme and all stockpiles of WMDs. Snap inspections of sites in Libya begin a week later by the IAEA. Oil flows from the country again after 20 years of trade embargoes by the U.N. and the U.S.

Attempted Assassination of Pakistani President

December 25, 2003.
Pakistani President Pervez Musharraf escapes the second of two bomb attempts on his life in twelve days while several vehicles in his motorcade were badly damaged.

Meteorite hits Spain

January 5, 2004.

A meteorite crashes into the Spanish province of Leon. While no one was hurt in the impact, witnesses report seeing a fireball and hearing explosion-like noises.

Airplane crashes into Red Sea

January 5, 2004.

A Flash Airlines, Boeing 737 crashes into the Red Sea minutes after take-off from the popular resort town of Sharm El-Sheikh, Egypt. All 148 aboard were killed in the tragedy.

A New Queen of the Seas.

January 8, 2004.

The Queen Mary 2 becomes the largest passenger ship ever built, surpassing the QE2 in height, width, length, weight, and cost. Cunard claims accommodations for 2,620 and a construction cost of over \$800 million.

A Containment Barrier.

January 12, 2004.

Israel begins construction on a 24.5 ft high barrier across parts of the West Bank to protect the city of Jerusalem from potential terrorists. Israeli Prime Minister, Ariel Sharon, comments, "Terror built the fence."

Toyota Takes Second.

January 23, 2004.

Toyota Motor Corporation surpasses Ford Motor Company for the first time to become the world's second largest automobile company in the world, selling the second most number of vehicles globally.

"Ladies and Gentleman, we got him."

December 14, 2003.

U.S. forces capture Saddam Hussein during a raid in Hussein's home town of Tikrit, Iraq. A tip from an unidentified source led U.S. forces to the area and after an intensive search he was found in a basement and captured with little resistance.

Afghanistan Gains New Constitution

January 1, 2004.

Led by Afghan President Hamid Karzai, a constitutional convention in Afghanistan took nearly three weeks to hammer out a new, 160-page constitution. "The hopes of the Afghan people" were drafted into the article, Karzai was quoted as saying.

Constitution Signed in Iraq

March 8, 2004.

The US - appointed Iraqi Governing Council signs an interim constitution that is intended to move the country towards a democratic future and prepare for the restoration of Iraqi sovereignty at the end of June.

Prime Minister Announced in Iraq

May 5, 2004.

Iyad Allawi has been chosen by the Iraqi Governing Council as the new prime minister of Iraq; the nomination has been backed by the US-led coalition government. Allawi, a Shiite Muslim is the founder of the former exile group, the Iraqi National Accord.

Interim Iraqi Government Named

June 1, 2004.

Sheikh Ghazi al-Yawar is announced as the interim Iraqi president; the US backed the move nearly four weeks before sovereignty is to be handed to the new government.

Casualties of Coalition Forces in Iraq

As of June 9, 2004 there have been 949 coalition deaths since the invasion of Iraq began, over a year ago. This number includes 833 Americans, 59 Britons, six Bulgarians, one Dane, one Dutch, one Estonian, eighteen Italians, one Latvian, six Poles, one Salvadoran, three Slovaks, eleven Spaniards, two Thai, and six Ukrainians. At least 5,013 soldiers have been wounded in action as reported by the Pentagon.

Terrorists hit Spain

March 12, 2004.

Ten backpack bombs rip through four trains in Madrid, Spain killing 190 and wounding more than 1,800. Described as the "European September 11th," al Qaeda and ETA immediately become prime suspects.

Deadly Explosion in North Korea

April 23, 2004

In Ryongchon, North Korea, 3,000 civilians are killed or injured as two 'international statesman' freight cars carrying with the classic phrase fertilizer strike an overhead electrical wire. Born Rolihlahla Dalibhunga, Mr. Mandela won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1993.

International Community says "Fairwell"

June 1, 2004

Nelson Mandela retires from his role as an 'international statesman' with the classic phrase "Don't call me, I'll call you." Born Rolihlahla Dalibhunga, Mr. Mandela won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1993.
