

The College Chapel exercise is conducted each morning by the President or a member of the Faculty in such manner as to afford opportunity for daily public worship. In addition, there are the usual numerous services of the many churches of Kalamazoo, regular attendance upon some of which is encouraged in every way. Kalamazoo churches are noted not only for their religious activities, but also for their wholesome and helpful social gatherings. Students are welcomed at these churches and may, if they will, find in them a fine opportunity for moral and spiritual growth while getting an education. The Christian organizations of the College encourage the students to take advantage of all such aids to a better life and a better equipment for the larger service.

OTHER RELIGIOUS ACTIVITIES.

College Prayer Meeting.

The Y. M. and Y. W. C. A. unite their efforts in the union prayer meeting which is held on alternate Thursday evenings at 7:30 o'clock. The characteristic Kazoo enthusiasm dominates these helpful hours and the Campus life is made more worthwhile through them.

Mission Study Class.

No student can afford to leave the Association Mission Study Class out of his schedule. Missionaries are no longer thought of as unsuccessful preachers or

women who were unable to teach school, but are broad-minded Christians, who devote their lives to a noble ideal and the interest in missions grows each year.

Capable leaders are secured for the Fall term and one hour a week is given to the pleasant and instructive courses offered by the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. This is worth your support, new students!

Bible Study.

Are you one of the many College students who is seeking to grow in spiritual power through "The Morning Watch?" The Bible classes are organized in the winter term, and the work made practical for inspiration to big things as well as to better daily living. The Bible is the most widely read book in the world, and culture, understanding of human relations, besides Christian development and knowledge of the teachings of Jesus depend on it.

Volunteer Band.

The Student Volunteer Movement for Foreign Missions is an activity present in every college. Perhaps no organization has more influence on the life of those who desire to dedicate themselves to definite Christian service. Each member of the Band has signed the declaration card of the movement—"It is my purpose if God permit, to become a foreign missionary."

Mutual encouragement and spiritual preparation for this life work is the object of the Band, and regular meetings are held in view of this end.

STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

Student Senate.

Among the most vital organizations of Kalamazoo College is the Student Senate. The Student Body decides matters of great importance, but the Senate represents the students in the many business activities. The members are selected in the following manner: One representative from each of the classes, President of the Student Body, Secretary of the Student Body, Manager of Oratory and Debate, Manager of Athletics and Managing Editor of "Index."

Societies for Girls.

There are two girls' societies in Kalamazoo College, which are not the least concern of the "Co-eds." The Euródelphian Literary Society was organized in 1856 and is composed of energetic worthwhile girls who mingle many good times with literary work and society life. The Kappa-Pi Society, organized in 1902, though young, is also flourishing and does a great many worth while things besides those directly within the scope of such an organization.

No function of the College is more important than that of the Societies, for Kalamazoo has so far done without sororities and fraternities and has grown strong like the students, through the ideals upheld by these two societies for women, which also influence social good times to so great an extent.

Societies for Men.

There are three good societies for the men of the college. They are on a par, all striving to develop orators and debaters and to keep each man in touch with the great topics of the day. The second or third week of college, "bids" are given out by the societies to the new and non-society men. That you might be familiar with the names, they are, The Sherwood Rhetorical Society, The Philolexian Lyceum, the Century Forum.

The Glee Clubs.

Every student with any musical talent whatever, has the privilege of trying out for the boys' or girls' glee clubs. These organizations are known throughout the state, and make state-wide tours during the Spring recess. * We are proud of these clubs; for very few colleges have such organizations.

The "K" Club.

The highest honors which the college offers an athlete is the privilege of wearing an orange "K" on a black sweater. The men having won "K's" have organized a club which is known as the "K" club. This club has endured for many years.

The "Index."

Each Thursday morning directly after chapel long lines of students and faculty members can be seen waiting, in their turn, to receive a copy of The "Index," the college weekly. This is an

independent paper published by the student body. What would "Kazoo" do without the "Index."

Pi Kappa Delta.

The Pi Kappa Delta is a national society, organized in 1913, with chapters in all the leading colleges and small universities in the middle west. The Kalamazoo College chapter, which is the Alpha, or first, Michigan chapter, was organized in 1918.

This society chooses its members in recognition of forensic worth. Kalamazoo College's long and splendid record in debate and oratory, coupled with its highest educational standard, gave the Orange and Black the best of entrance qualifications.

Members of a Pi Kappa Delta chapter wear the sign of a membership in the form of a key, awarded for work in both oratory and debate.

The Pi Kappa Delta is a society in which membership is to be greatly desired. It's already fine record indicates the place it has assumed in college activities.
