## COLLEGE SERVICES

### Counseling of Students

The Deans' Office has the responsibility for arranging our counseling program. Already you have received letters of welcome from the Deans so you may feel somewhat acquainted with them. Their office is located on the first floor of Bowen and you will find there a willingness to assist you with any perplexing problem which may arise during your first days or throughout your college years. Feel free to take your questions there for the Deans will gladly help you or refer you to the person who can.

When you register for the first time at Kalamazoo, you will be assigned a faculty counsellor. He will help you choose your courses and plan your studies—indeed, your program must be OK'd by him before you can actually register. You will also find him always ready to help you with any other problems which may develop during your stay here, and there are sure to be some. Generally speaking, it is a good policy to drop in and talk to him whenever you find yourself worried about studies, or about money, or about personal relationships. As a matter of fact, it is a good policy to keep him up-to-date even when everything is going all right.

For what he tells you, your advisor will depend, to an extent at least, upon the results of the Freshman and Sophomore Testing Programs, and he will gladly explain the results of these tests to you if you ask him. You can find out more about these testing programs by turning to page 42 of the College Catalogue. They are administered by Dr. Raymond Hightower, Room 204, Mandelle Library, and he also gives vocational aptitude tests to students who want them. All you need for the vocational tests is a request from your advisor or the Deans that you be given them.

At the same time that you are given a faculty advisor, you will be assigned a student counsellor—another undergraduate who has been here long enough to know the ropes and who can tell you much about life in Kalamazoo. Your student counsellor is not so much an advisor as a friend to whom you can go with any questions or any problems you meet—a friend who, if accepted frankly and freely, can help you avoid all kinds of misunderstandings and blunders on the rules and regulations which follow and also help you use wisely all services provided for your convenience.

## Health Service

It is expected that final negotiations will be completed to retain a college physician who will hold office hours in the Infirmary. His services on the campus will be free to all resident students. The above program would replace the hospitalization plan which in many cases duplicates the protection provided by the family's Blue Cross contract.

A resident nurse keeps office hours regularly at posted hours during the school week, and she will be on call at all times. Illness should be reported immediately in order to assure proper attention.

## Tray Service

Trays may be taken out of Welles Dining Hall in case of sickness. The student receiving a "sick tray" must have the tray returned the following day. All trays must be checked out and in. A fine is charged for trays returned late.

## Mandelle Library

Mandelle Library is the focal point of learning. The library staff has prepared for distribution to students a booklet with information concerning its holdings and regulations.

## Bookstore

The College maintains a bookstore for the convenience of the students. Adjoining Welles Lounge, it handles the textbooks and supplies. Many other items of value to K-College students are displayed and sold at the store.

# GENERAL SOCIAL REGULATIONS

## Religious Activities

Religious services in Stetson Chapel form an important part of life at Kalamazoo College. Chapel periods are held on Mondays and Fridays at 10:00 a.m. and are conducted by faculty, students, and religious leaders. Attendance at Chapel services is required in order to round the students' knowledge and interest in all phases of the liberal arts and to promote the spirit of Christian fellowship. Four absences per semester are permitted.

On alternate Wednesdays at 10:00 a.m., Convocations are sponsored by the Student Senate with attendance required. Two absences per semester are permitted.

## Chapel

Religious activities of the campus are organized under the direction of the Dean of the Chapel, assisted by an advisory Board of Religious Activities composed of students and faculty members.

The United Student Christian Association is a recently-organized campus group with membership open to all students. The purpose of this organization is to provide fellowship and opportunities for service for all students interested in the Christian way of life. Its program of social events, service projects, and religious activities fills a significant place in campus life.

Closely associated with campus religious activities is the work of the Inter-Church Student Council. This council is inter-denominational and is sponsored by several local churches.

## Rules and Norms of Conduct

Kalamazoo College assumes that the principles of honorable conduct are familiar and significant to all students.

Two kinds of behavior may be distinguished:

1. Conduct which causes embarrassment or discomfort to other individuals or groups in the community.
2. Conduct in violation of specific rules.

Cases involving either kind of misconduct will be handled by the Disciplinary Councils of the men's and women's dormitories or by the Judicial Council composed of members of the faculty, administration, and students.

## Welles Dining Hall

Men and women have meals together with breakfast and luncheon cafeteria style and dinner a served meal. Suits or sport jackets are considered appropriate for men at dinner.

The ground floor of Welles Hall serves as an informal meeting place for students and faculty. A soda fountain and sandwich bar provide refreshment. Such decorum as is customary when a guest in the home of a friend is expected in both the dining hall and the lounge.

## Classes, Bells, Absences, and Probation

Classes are 50 minutes in length, allowing ten minutes for students to get to the next class.

Bells indicating end and beginning of class periods are sounded in recitation buildings and Welles Lounge. No bells are sounded in the dormitories. Students are individually responsible for promptness to class.

Students are expected to be present at all regular class or laboratory sessions of the class. Class absences may be granted by the Deans for reasons listed in the Catalogue on page 58.

A student is placed on probation by the Personnel Committee when his grades for any semester fall below satisfactory standing. See Catalogue, page 60.

## Use of Telephone

To call an administrative office or a faculty member's office from one of the dormitories, ask for "Bowen operator." Then tell the Bowen operator the name of the teacher or office you desire.

The men's dormitories are operated as a unit; one operator in Hoben Hall serves both Hoben and Harmon Halls. If you are calling from a campus phone, ask for Hoben Hall and give the name of the resident to whom you wish to speak. If you are calling from outside, dial 4-6141.

The Trowbridge House phone number is 4-6131. Ask the Trowbridge operator for the resident to whom you wish to speak.

Long distance calls should be made only from pay telephones located in the dormitories.

## Handling of Valuables and Money

The College can assume no responsibility for loss of valuables or money. Students should not leave large sums of money in their rooms.

It is advisable to use the inexpensive "Pay-by-Check" plans offered by Kalamazoo banks.

Small checks (limit \$35) may be cashed by the cashier in the Business Office. A service charge is made for out-of-town checks.

## The Use of Cars

Students who must have a car are required to apply for a permit before the time of enrollment. This regulation applies to both resident and non-resident students. Blanks for application are available at the Deans' Office. New license numbers must be added to the record in the Deans' Office as soon as plates are changed.

Prohibited parking spaces are those reserved for the staff and guests from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday noons; and campus driveways and the maintenance yard at all times. Students who park their cars in these places are subject to fines payable to the Business Office. The city prohibits parking on the streets overnight.

Careful driving is essential; college drivers must be careful drivers. Women students must have parental permission to ride out-of-town in cars.

## Smoking

It is tradition that there shall be no smoking on the College campus. This includes any part of the campus except where smoking is expressly permitted. In general, where ash trays are part of the permanent equipment of the building, smoking is permitted.

It is traditional not to smoke when on the dance floor at College parties.

Smoking is not permitted on porches or steps of the dormitories. Women and men may smoke in their rooms, but no person who does not smoke will be required to room with a person who smokes. There shall be no smoking in the main lounge of Mary Trowbridge House.

## Gambling and Liquor

All forms of gambling are prohibited.

The possession or use of alcoholic beverages in any form, on the campus, in dormitories, or in connection with any College function or sponsored trip is forbidden.

A guest of a College student is expected to conform to these traditions and regulations.

Students should be sure that their guests are informed of acceptable practices; students are held responsible for the conduct of their guests.

Any resident entering the dormitory or appearing at a College function under the influence of liquor will render himself liable to discipline.

## General Information Concerning Parties

Special functions by any organization or group of students must be scheduled on the College calendar at least one week in advance with the permission of the Social Committee. Requests for social functions are made on blanks secured in the Deans' Office. A current calendar will be printed in the Index; the complete calendar is available in the Deans' Office.

A student committee should be set up for each social event and this committee is responsible for the maintenance of standards and traditions of the College and for filing a report of the event in the Deans' Office.

## Chaperones

Groups of organized social gatherings of men and women are to have chaperones.

Two faculty couples are required for all college parties. At Senate parties or all-college events, the President and his wife, the Vice President, the Dean of Men, and the Dean of Women should be invited as special guests.

The social chairman of the sponsoring organization is held responsible for courtesy and attention in arranging entertainment and transportation for the chaperones. Chaperones should feel free to make suggestions to the social chairman at any time.

Chaperones should be invited at least ten days before the event, and names listed in the Deans' Office. An informal note is preferable to a telephoned or verbal invitation. Since chaperones are guests of the group, a note of appreciation to them after the occasion is in order.

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## CONSTITUTION OF THE STUDENT BODY

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OF KALAMAZOO COLLEGE

*Preamble . . . We, the students of Kalamazoo College, do hereby adopt this Constitution for the purpose of unifying and co-ordinating all non-academic activities of the student body and of co-operating with the faculty and administration in all matters relative to the welfare of Kalamazoo College.*

## ARTICLE I

### Name

This organization shall be known as the Student Body of Kalamazoo College.

## ARTICLE II

### Membership

Section 1. All graduate and undergraduate students of Kalamazoo College shall be members of the Student Body.

Section 2. Upon the notification to the Student Senate by the Office of the Dean of the expulsion, suspension, or withdrawal of any student from the college, that student shall no longer have the right to vote or to participate in any student activity until his reinstatement has been recognized by the Office of the Dean, and the Student Senate has received notification thereof.

## ARTICLE III

### Legislative Authority

Section 1. The legislative group of the Student Body shall be known as the Student Senate.

Section 2. Membership in the Student Senate:

1. Shall be restricted to undergraduate students.
2. Shall include an Executive Committee consisting of the president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer, each of whom shall have one vote except the president, who shall vote only in the event of a tie.
3. Shall include a Representative Committee consisting of the president of the Women's League, the president of the Men's Union, the student representative of the Religious Affairs' Board, the M.I.A.A. representative, and two representatives from each of the four undergraduate classes, each of whom shall have one vote.
4. No person on the Student Senate shall hold more than one voting office.
5. Standing EX OFFICIO members shall include: the editor of the Index, the editor of the Boiling Pot, a representative of radio station WJMD, and a representative of Forensics. Student organizations not included in the Representative Committee may obtain standing EX OFFICIO membership on the Student Senate upon application confirmed by a two-thirds vote of the Student Senate.
6. Shall include the President of the college or a representative appointed by him, and/or the Dean of Men, and/or the Dean of Women to act as advisors to the Student Senate.

Section 3. The Student Senate shall:

1. Enact all rules, regulations, and by-laws necessary to the proper functioning of the Student Senate pursuant to this Constitution.
2. Determine non-academic policies and programs which effect the Student Body as a whole.
3. Determine and approve the annual budget of the Student Senate.
4. Approve all appointments made by the president by a two-thirds majority vote.
5. Impeach, suspend, or remove any member of the Executive Committee or the Representative Committee of the Student Senate by a three-fourths majority vote on the basis of the grounds set-forth in Article VI as reported by an investigating committee appointed by the Student Senate.
6. Exercise all other powers not expressly prohibited to it by this Constitution.

7. Meet each week during the academic year. No regular meeting of the Student Senate shall be cancelled except by unanimous decision of the Executive Committee.
8. Approve as members of the Student Senate, by a two-thirds majority vote, the student representatives from the M.I.A.A. and the Religious Affairs' Board.
9. If a majority of the Student Senate so desires, submit to the student body for referendum any legislation reviewed or passed by the Student Senate, the approval of which requires a simple majority of the voters, excepting money bills which require a two-thirds majority, at a special election, the time and place to be determined by the Student Senate.
10. Initiate all charges before the Judicial Council of all alleged infractions of its laws.

Section 4. A quorum of the Student Senate shall be two-thirds of the voting members.

## ARTICLE IV

### Executive Authority

Section 1. The Executive Committee:

1. The presiding officer shall be the president of the Student Senate, who shall be empowered to cast one vote in the event of a tie.
2. All decisions shall be by a majority vote unless otherwise specified.
3. The Executive Committee shall meet prior to each regularly scheduled session of the Student Senate, at a time designated by them, to determine the agenda of the next general session.
4. The Executive Committee shall supervise the execution of policies as established by the Student Senate; determine by a majority vote emergency policies of the Student Senate, when such decisions may be required by immediate and imperative problems arising between regularly scheduled meetings of the Student Senate, subject to the review of the Student Senate at its next meeting.
5. A quorum of the Executive Committee shall be two-thirds of the voting members.

Section 2. The Powers and Duties of the Executive Officers of the Student Senate:

1. The president shall:
  - a. Be the chief executive officer of the Student Senate.
  - b. Officially represent the Student Senate and the Student Body in all matters which will not duplicate the functions of existing Student Senate offices or committees.
  - c. Be responsible for the general execution of all decisions of the Student Senate and the Executive Committee.
  - d. Make the appointments of all committees deemed necessary by the Student Senate for the proper functioning of that student organization, not in contravention with this Constitution.
  - e. Perform such duties as specifically delegated to him by the Student Senate and/or by the Constitution. He shall delegate such powers as shall be necessary to the fulfillment of his office.
  - f. Be a member EX OFFICIO of all boards and committees.
  - g. Have the power to authorize the expenditure of not more than \$15.00 subject to the review of the Student Senate.
  - h. Make administrative appointments, subject to the review of the Student Senate at its next meeting, in the event of an emergency

whereby neither the Student Senate nor the Executive Committee can be convened.

2. The vice-president shall:
  - a. Succeed the president of the Student Senate in the case of removal, resignation, or the inability of the president to perform the duties of his office.
  - b. Act as Social Chairman.
  - c. Act as chairman or appoint a chairman to be in full charge of the Homecoming Dance, Senate Concert, Washington Banquet, May Fete Dance, Freshman Initiation and Mixer, and all other social activities for which the Senate has the responsibility.
  - d. Serve as a member of the Social and Cultural Affairs Committee.
  - e. Serve as a member of the Financial Board of Control.
3. The secretary shall:
  - a. Supervise the keeping of all records and the handling of official correspondence.
  - b. Prepare for publication, announcement, and posting the minutes of all student Senate meetings.
  - c. Serve as public relations director of the Student Senate.
4. The treasurer shall:
  - a. Prepare an annual budget in accordance with the recommendations of the Executive Committee to be presented to the Student Senate.
  - b. Be the sole disbursing agent for the Student Senate.
  - c. Disburse funds only upon request of the Student Senate in accordance with the annual budget.
  - d. Keep complete and accurate accounts of the receipt and disbursement of all funds.
  - e. Prepare a financial report each semester, which shall be approved by a faculty or administrative auditor.
  - f. Be a member of the Financial Board of Control.
  - g. Serve as Manager of Concessions.

#### ARTICLE V

##### Judicial Authority

Section 1. The judicial group of the Student Body shall be known as the Judicial Council.

Section 2. 1. Membership on the Judicial Council shall include the Dean of Men and the Dean of Women; two members of the faculty chosen by the faculty; and four members of the Student Body elected at the general election subject to the provisions of Article XI, Section 3.

2. Student membership on the Judicial Council shall be subject to the following provisions:
  - a. No candidate for a voting office on the Student Senate shall be a candidate for membership on the Judicial Council.
  - b. No voting member of the Student Senate shall be a member of the Judicial Council.
  - c. All members of the Judicial Council shall be members of the Junior or Senior classes.

Section 3. 1. The Judicial Council shall have the authority to render decisions on all cases of alleged infractions of laws passed by the Student Senate. Disciplinary measures shall be rendered in accordance with the laws of the Student Senate.

2. The Judicial Council shall act as a Court of Appeals from the disciplinary committees of the Joint-House Council and the Trowbridge House Council.
3. The decision of the Judicial Council shall be final. The defendant or persons representing the defendant may appeal the decision of the Judicial Council to the President of the College, who may present an appeal to the Judicial Council for review. The decision of the Judicial Council on the review shall be final.
4. In the event of a tie vote the decision of the Judicial Council shall be determined by the Administrative Council of the College.

#### ARTICLE VI

##### Impeachment, Suspension, and Removal

Any member of the Executive or Representative Committees of the Student Senate or the student members of the Judicial Council may be impeached on the grounds of:

1. Embezzlement, fraud, or other misdemeanors.
2. Conduct unbecoming the good name of the College or the Student Senate.
3. Malfeasance, misfeasance, or nonfeasance in office.
4. Acting contrary to the provisions of this Constitution.

#### ARTICLE VII

##### Membership of the Student Senate in other Organizations

Section 1. Affiliation:

1. The Student Senate may affiliate with any student organization whose principles and policies are decreed consonant with this Constitution and the policies of the Student Senate by the following method: the Executive Committee shall consider any proposed affiliation and shall report to the Student Senate the desirability and possibility of such affiliation. Any affiliation shall be determined by a two-thirds majority vote of the Student Senate. Any affirmative recommendation of affiliation shall be presented to the Student Body, the ratification of which shall be by a two-thirds vote of the Student Body at a special election, the date to be determined by the Student Senate.

Section 2. Dis-affiliation:

1. The Executive Committee shall consider all matter of dis-affiliation and shall report the findings to the Student Senate.
2. Dis-affiliation shall be determined by a two-thirds majority vote of the Student Senate.

#### ARTICLE VIII

##### Constitutional Amendments

Amendments to this Constitution shall be made by a two-thirds vote of the Student Body at the general election, provided that they are first approved either by a three-fourths majority vote of the Student Senate or by a petition from ten per cent of the Student Body, said petition to be posted in places designated by the Executive Committee at least one week prior to the general election.

#### ARTICLE IX

##### Initiative and Referendum

Section 1. It shall be the right of the Student Body to petition the Student Senate for the enactment of any legislation not in contravention with this Constitution, provided that the signatures of at least twenty per cent of the Student Body are obtained on said petition favoring enactment of such legislation, and

that for one week prior to the circulation of said petition, notice is published in the school paper and on the bulletin boards of the intention to circulate same.

Section 2. It shall be the right of the Student Body to enact any legislation not in contravention with this constitution, by a majority of the voters, provided that the signatures of at least twenty per cent of the Student Body are obtained on said petition favoring enactment of such legislation, and that for one week prior to the circulation of said petition, notice is published in the school newspaper and on the bulletin boards of the intention to circulate same.

Section 3. It shall be the right of the Student Body to vote by referendum on any legislation passed by the Student Senate, provided that the signatures of at least twenty per cent of the Student Body be obtained on a petition favoring the referendum vote, and that for one week prior to the circulation of said petition, notice is published in the school newspaper and on the bulletin boards of the intention to circulate same. Any legislation to be invalidated requires a two-thirds majority of the voters.

Section 4. The voting on any legislation as provided for in Sections 2 and 3 of this Article shall be held at a special election, the time and place to be determined by the Student Senate.

### ARTICLE X

#### Student Body Meetings

Section 1. The Student Senate may call Student Body meetings upon their own initiative or upon the request by members of the Student Body.

Section 2. The Student Senate shall be required to call Student Body meetings when presented with a petition requesting same. This petition shall contain the signatures of at least twenty per cent of the Student Body.

### ARTICLE XI

#### The General Election

Section 1. The general election shall be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in May.

Section 2. Petitions containing twenty-five signatures are required for candidacy for offices to be voted on in the general election and shall be submitted to the president of the Student Senate not later than one week prior to the general election.

Section 3. In the general election one more than half constitutes the simple majority. In the event that no candidate receives a majority of the votes, a second election shall be held within three days of the first election between the two candidates receiving the most votes in the first election.

Section 4. The freshman representatives to the Student Senate shall be elected during the second week following Homecoming.

### ARTICLE XII

#### Vacancies

Section 1. All vacancies occurring in the Student Senate shall be filled as determined by the body from which the office originated.

Section 2. In the event of a vacancy occurring in the offices of the vice-president, secretary, or treasurer the president shall appoint a person to fulfill the functions of the office vacated.
