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## Special Scholarship Program for “Forgotten” Middle-Income Students

In today's academic marketplace, financial assistance to students has become one of the largest items in the college budget. The combination of concern for the worthy student of limited financial status and the availability of an increasing amount of private and public monies for such aid has created a picture undreamed of in financial-aid circles a decade ago.

Yet, between the affluent student who needs no financial assistance and the youth from the lower-income brackets who suddenly finds it economically viable to attend a quality private college, there stands a forgotten student in a forgotten family. Call his family “middle-middle income”; call them “the \$12,000-\$18,000 class”; call them the “backbone class in American society.” These are the families who are not expected to give token amounts — but to make sacrificial gifts — to the Community Chest, the hospital building drive, and the annual budget of St. Mark's Church. Add to this the living standard expected of this middle-management man on the move, and one is not surprised to hear him say, “I don't care what the computer shows. I can't pay \$3000 a year to educate each of my three children!”

At Kalamazoo College we have become increasingly concerned in recent months about these forgotten parents in the \$12,000-to-\$18,000 salary bracket. Ruled out of participation in federal and state loan programs, and often eliminated from scholarship assistance by the usual “need factor” procedures, the private schools are losing these students (many the children of alumni of these private schools) to the public institutions. Stu-

dents, sometimes encouraged by their parents, are rationalizing in favor of the seemingly less expensive state schools.

In order to encourage these students, particularly the children of alumni, to give more serious consideration to Kalamazoo College, the Board of Trustees through its Executive Committee recently authorized and encouraged the College's Office of Financial Aid to: (1) Explore ways and means of demonstrating to these students how available state and college financial-aid resources are shortening the gap between private and public education costs; (2) Exercise greater flexibility in ascertaining need and awarding aid to students in special categories, such as alumni children, who may not qualify for aid by the usual criteria; and (3) As a beginning, increase the size of the awards available to Stone Honor Scholars and, where possible, make campus jobs and long-term loans available to these students.

As you discuss the choice of a college with your children and those of your friends, encourage them to choose the college of their choice, not the college they think they can afford. Kalamazoo is interested in the student who believes in academic excellence, concerned citizenship, and the contributing of both to the life of the College and the world. This student is often the son or daughter of alumni. He is often the top high school student and the potential leader and leaven on the college scene. Private education has much to offer him. Kalamazoo College wants him in this academic community and is trying to be flexible enough in its financial-aid program to enable him to come.

## Ford Support for Humanities Program

Supported by a \$40,000 Ford Foundation grant, Kalamazoo College will launch a faculty development program in the humanities with particular emphasis on faculty-student collaboration. The College is among 61 four-year liberal arts colleges — and the only one in Michigan — to share in the \$2.7 million grant. The \$40,000 sum will be matched by a contribution from the College over the next four years. From the fifth year on, the College will continue the program with its own funds. The funds will be used for grants-in-aid to individual humanities faculty members for research, study in new disciplines, refresher courses and other opportunities for intellectual stimulation. The program will start this fall.

## Center for Urban Studies

A Center for Urban Studies has been established at Kalamazoo College and will be directed by Dr. Raymond L. Hightower, chairman of the department of sociology and anthropology and former Kalamazoo mayor. The Center is aimed toward making meaningful contributions to possible solutions of urban problems. An advisory committee of prominent citizens and experts in urban studies is to be formed to guide the activities of the Center. Dr. Daniel Moynihan, nationally known director of the joint Harvard-MIT Center for Urban Studies, has agreed to serve as consultant for the program. Two recent grants will assist in setting up portions of the overall program — a \$10,000 grant from the Department of Labor, and a grant of \$6,600 from the U.S. Office of Education.

## Summer Opportunity Program

The Independent Colleges Opportunity Program (ICOP) is sponsored on six private college campuses in Michigan by the Association of Independent Colleges and Universities of Michigan. The Kalamazoo College program is financed by grants from Kellogg Foundation and the American Baptist Board of Education. It is a college readiness program for high school seniors who need specialized academic and financial assistance to go to college. The staff this summer includes Mr. and Mrs. Walden Baskerville. He is guidance counselor at Kalamazoo Central High School. Dr. John Freund, from Kings College in Wilkes-Barre, Pa., and Mr. Thomas Asmus, from Western Michigan University, are also staff members. Dr. Haydn Ambrose is coordinator of the program.

## Going to Yugoslavia

Robert P. Nash '69 and Dr. Raymond L. Hightower have been selected to participate in the American-Yugoslav Seminar this summer, where social, political and economic aspects of the two countries will be discussed. Nash is one of 18 American students selected, and Dr. Hightower will be among four American faculty members at the seminar.

## New Center Director

Robert Winblad, associate director of the Center for Management Studies at Kalamazoo College, assumed the directorship of the Center, July 1. He succeeds Dr. John L. Komives who will become director of the Center for Independent Venture Management, Milwaukee, Wisc. Winblad was appointed to his current post last January and came from Cincinnati Milling Machine Co. where he was manager of new product development. The Center for Management Studies, an activity of Kalamazoo College, provides special courses for management level personnel in the Kalamazoo area and southwestern Michigan. During 1966-67, the Center conducted some 23 courses, both on-campus and in-plant, for 536 persons.

## More Briefs...

Dr. Frances Diebold, professor emeritus of biology, who retired last year after 44 years of service, was honored at the annual meeting of the American Baptist Convention in Boston. She was cited for her contributions to teaching and scholarship, at a higher education luncheon in her honor . . . Kalamazoo College has received a \$12,000 National Science Foundation grant, to be matched by the College, for the purchase of a \$22,000 plus "nuclear magnetic resonance spectrometer." Kalamazoo College is believed to be one of only a few colleges in the nation to receive a NSF grant toward the purchase of this equipment . . . The College has received an unrestricted grant of \$1,000 from the International Nickel Company, Inc. . . . Two seniors have won NSF graduate fellowships — Agnis Kaugars, Kalamazoo, who will study topology at MIT; and Robert Purkey, Allegan, who plans to study bio-chemistry at Stanford University . . . Two Kalamazoo College students have been accepted into a special marine biology program to be held in Santa Barbara, Calif., this summer with the assistance of a \$28,410 NSF grant. Robin Wicks, Franklin Lakes, N.J., and Paul Friedrich, Midland, are among the 24 students participating, under the cooperative sponsorship of the Great Lakes Colleges Association, of which Kalamazoo is a member college . . . Kalamazoo College has been awarded a \$6,771 State Board of Education grant to conduct a series of conferences for local governmental officials in the use of metropolitan councils in solving areawide problems. Dr. Wen C. Chen is the director of the program administered by the Greater Kalamazoo Area Project under the auspices of Kalamazoo College . . . Marilyn Rehberg, Midland graduating senior, and James Server, Muskegon junior, were the recipients of the 1968 Maynard Owen Williams Essay Contest prize, awarded to students writing the best essays about their foreign study experiences . . . The summer quarter, now underway, brings back to the campus the 180 sophomores who spent the spring quarter in off-campus work or social service related to their fields of study; 44 students who spent the spring quarter in foreign study. Also on campus are the 198 juniors who took part in the fall and winter foreign study program, returning to the campus last spring from centers in 18 cities in nine foreign countries.
