--President Rainsford has returned from the Washington, D.C. meeting of the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities (NAICU), where he was elected to a second term of office as Chairman.

--Warren Board was appointed by Governor Milliken to the Eastern Michigan University Board of Regents. He succeeds Edward J. McCormick of Monroe in a term which expires at the end of 1986.

--President Rainsford will host a dinner for 50 members of the Founders' and President's Societies on February 23 preceding a performance of The Comedy of Errors. Founders' and President's Society members give \$1,000 and \$500 per year, respectively, to the Annual Fund.

--Student committees representing all dorms and commuter students will be telephoning alumni between February 19 and March 1 to solicit gifts for the 1979 Annual Fund Drive. The student committees, led by Chairman Curt Haserodt (K'79), will be calling individuals who have not previously made gifts to the Annual Fund. The committee picking up the greatest number of new pledges will win ten dinners given by the Kalamazoo Hilton.

--Results of the 1978 Annual Fund Drive have been announced by Co-chairmen Wayne and Virginia Stone. The College received 3,500 gifts totaling \$703,159 -- an increase of 9% over 1977 totals. College alumni donated the highest amount, contributing in excess of \$172,310. Annual Fund volunteers were honored by the College at a reception held on January 19.

--Ed Baker, along with other "K" coaches, hosted a Student/Athlete's program at Northland Inn in Southfield on Thursday, January 25, for Detroit area high school students interested in Kalamazoo College. A similar program will be held at the Grand Rapids Holiday Inn North on Sunday, February 18.

--Donna Berry has joined the library staff as circulation supervisor.

--W.C. Chen's recent activities include conducting a one-day seminar on effective management for the Michigan Association of County Clerks on January 23, a ten-week seminar at Ronnigen-Petter, division of Dover Corporation, begun on Jan. 16, and a 6-7 week seminar at Durametallic Corporation, begun on Feb. 12. He also has agreed to serve on a committee to select a planning consultant firm for the City of Portage, and a committee to select candidates for community service award at the Kalamazoo Fisher Body Plant.
