BELL DEDICATION AND FESTIVAL SCHEDULED JUNE 2

The Kalamazoo College bells will be dedicated at a special service in Stetson Chapel beginning at noon on Saturday, June 2. With the dedication, Kalamazoo officially becomes the only city in Michigan and the 14th city in the nation with a set of English tower bells.

The Bell Festival will begin at 12:30 p.m. on the campus quadrangle and Academy Street, which will be closed between Bulkley and Carmel.

Patterned in the style of English country fairs, the festival will feature craft displays, entertainment and refreshments. The festival will be highlighted by a three-hour bell peal and an authentic English tea, replete with scones and tea cakes.

GARDNER ACKLEY TO PRESENT MONROE LECTURES MAY 21

Noted economist Dr. Gardner Ackley will be the featured speaker for the 16th annual Monroe Seminar on Money and Banking at Kalamazoo College Monday, May 21.

Ackley will deliver lectures at 3:30 p.m. and 8 p.m. in Dalton Theatre. The topic of the afternoon lecture will be "Government Macroeconomic Policy in an Election Year." At 8 p.m., Ackley will present "The Growth of Economic Knowledge."

Dr. Ackley has been continuously associated on the economics faculty of the University of Michigan since 1940. In addition to his academic achievements which include authoring two widely-used major textbooks, Ackley has held many distinguished governmental posts, among them Chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisors and Ambassador to Italy.

INTERNATIONAL COLLOQUIUM

The second annual International Colloquium will be held on Wednesday, May 16, in the President's Lounge, Hicks Center. Speakers are scheduled throughout the day, beginning at 9 a.m.

Patterned on the successful model from last year which dealt with the topic of deployment of nuclear weapons in Europe, this year's colloquium will be on the topic, "Central America: Is U.S. Policy Self-Defeating?"

Speakers for the day are Ms. Karen DeYoung, foreign editor of the Washington Post; Dr. Thomas Casstevens, special advisor to the administrator, U.S. Agency for International Development; and Sister Patty Shaw, co-director of the Michigan Interchurch Committee on Central American Human Rights.

HORNET NETTERS COMPETE IN NCAA DIVISION III CHAMPIONSHIPS

Kalamazoo College will host the women's NCAA Division III Championships at Stowe Stadium next week, May 7-12. Representing the College will be sophomore Linda Topolsky (Harbor Springs), ranked third in Division III in the Midwest.

Traveling to Emory University in Atlanta next week will be the men's team, ranked third in NCAA Division III. The Hornet netters were one of eight teams in the nation selected for the Division III championships.

Sophomore Tim Corwin (Brookfield, WI) is ranked fourth in the nation in Division III and junior Adam Bottorff (Toledo, OH) is ranked 35th. Doubles players Corwin and Kalamazoo freshman Alex Palladino are ranked sixth.

ROMEO PHILLIPS RECIPIENT OF FULBRIGHT GRANT

Dr. Romeo Phillips, associate professor of education, has been awarded a Fulbright-Hays grant by the United States Educational and Cultural Foundation. The \$23,000 stipend will enable Phillips to spend the 1984-85 academic year as lecturer/researcher at the Cuttington University College in Liberia.

During that period, Phillips will conduct research which seeks to draw a parallel between the indigenous music of Liberia and traditional Black-American folk music.

Initiated by the Fulbright Act of 1946, the program is designed to enable the government of the United States "to increase mutual understanding between the people of the United States and the people of other countries."
