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- Kalamazoo College's men's varsity tennis team won the national NCAA Division III Tournament Championship on May 11-13 at Ohio Wesleyan. The team scored 20 points overall, easily beating the second-place team with 12 points for the national championship.
- Kalamazoo College's women's varsity tennis team won the Michigan championship at the State Small College Tennis Tournament on May 11-13 in Ann Arbor. The women captured the titles in flight one singles, and flights one, two, and three doubles, as well as the overall championship.
- Kalamazoo College has the reputation for being the only institution of higher learning in the state of Michigan affiliated with the local Suzuki Talent Education program. This fact was discovered by Jan Bogart, who spent the weekend of May 12-14 at Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp participating in a Suzuki Teachers' Workshop sponsored by the Michigan American String Teachers' Association.
- A piano student at the Kalamazoo College Music Center place third in the Junior High Division of the regional Steinway Auditions held May 5 in Grand Rapids. Mark Doster has studied at the Music Center for three years, one year with Susan Saltee, and the past two years with Mrs. Harry (Betty) Ray.

Notables

President Rainsford gave the Commencement address at Alderson Broaddus College in West Virginia on May 21. The title of his address was "It Makes a Difference" and he was substituting for President Jimmy Carter who was unable to attend. On May 16, Dr. Rainsford was the principal speaker at a Detroit businessmen's luncheon hosted by E. Estes, the President of General Motors and a Kalamazoo College trustee. His subject was private higher education. He also addressed the Kalamazoo Kiwanis Club on May 3 on "Freedom of Choice - American Style." Dr. Rainsford testified at hearings on April 14 at the Area Conference for the Michigan White House Conference, sponsored by the National Commission on Libraries and Information Science. He spoke on the needs and concerns of academic libraries and their users.

Ralph Deal gave a paper at the 9th annual Pittsburgh Conference on Modelling and Simulation in April. It was entitled "System Dynamics in a Course on Nuclear Energy for Non-science Majors."

Hardy Fuchs presented a paper on "The Teaching of Composition" to the Michigan Chapter of the American Association of Teachers of German at its Spring Workshop held in May at Calvin College.

Philip Gillette had an article published in the December 1977 issue of Slavic Review. His topic was "Motivational-Ideational Analysis of Stalin's Foreign Policy."

Gail Griffin expects publication this July of her essay "Ruskin's Praeterita: The Autobiographer's Dilemma." Her essay will appear in the book Interspace and the Inward Sphere: Essays on the Romantic and Victorian Self, a collection of 10 essays on 19th century British prose nonfiction, to be published by Western Illinois University Press.

Larry Jaquith participated in panel discussions at the annual United States Institute for Theatre Technology Conference in Phoenix, Arizona in April. The topic was the establishment of a National Internship Program for theatre students which will be modeled on the successful ones at Kalamazoo and Ithaca Colleges.

Katheryn Rajnak had a paper published in the March issue of the Journal of the Optical Society of America. The paper was entitled "Regularities in s-electron Binding Energies in $1^N s^M$ Configurations" co-authored with B.W. Shore of the Lawrence Livermore Lab in California.

Kathleen Reish delivered a paper at the Thirteenth Conference on Medieval Studies held at Western Michigan University in May. The paper was entitled "A Reinterpretation of the Uses of Allegory in Part II of The Romance of the Rose." She was also awarded a stipend by the National Endowment for the Humanities as one of twelve participants in a summer seminar, "Word and Image in Medieval Art and Narrative Literature," to be conducted by Professor Stephen G. Nichols at Dartmouth.

Swede Thomas participated in a regional conference on Church-Related Higher Education at Carthage College in May.

Wayne Wright attended meetings of the Acoustical Society of America in Providence, Rhode Island, in May. He presented a paper entitled "Radiation of Sawtooth Waves from the Open End of a Pipe," which described work that was begun by a 1977 'K' graduate, Jeff Kuhn, during his Career Service Quarter at the University of Texas at Austin. Wright also served as chairman of the Committee on Education in Acoustics and as secretary of the Coordinating Committee on Environmental Acoustics.
